Caythorpe Church has two stained glass windows dedicated to the Squadron. The service, which the Rev Sara will lead this year, is always a very moving occasion.

What ideas do you have on how it will look?



## **Beckingham Village Hall Social Club**

In 2017, a group of villagers here in Beckingham got together to set up a social club. We felt that, with the closure of the village pub, we would benefit from a social club to establish a hub for villagers to meet, to hold various social events and build on the village support system for one another.

We have now been open for 7 years, have over 120 members and continue to provide fun and friendship for one another. We operate on a fully voluntary basis and welcome any new members.

All profits are put back into the club and we are proud to have raised over £7k in support of various charities including Lincs and Notts Air Ambulance, the Ukraine Appeal and Newark Children's Bereavement Centre, as well as Macmillan Cancer Support, for whom we now run an annual coffee morning.

We are now open 4 times a week, as follows - On Wednesdays from 2 pm, there is a relaxed, warm and welcoming atmosphere for those wanting to call in for a drink, not always alcoholic, and enjoy company and conversation with friends and neighbours. This has led on to a breakfast club on the first Friday of each month, where a local venue is chosen, orders placed, then members enjoy good food and conversation with one another.

On Fridays from 7 pm, at the end of the working week, it's good to unwind.

On the last Friday of the month, we have 'Open the Box'. At 9 pm, we draw names from those who have entered and the lucky person to pick the correct key wins the cash value inside the box. Past winnings have seen takings of over £100!

On Saturdays from 4 pm, it is nice to call in after a day of chores, watch sports and/or take part in regular quizzes or functions, which usually start around 7.30 pm. On Sundays from 2 pm, during the football season, Premier League games can be watched on our large televisions with buffet-style snacks usually laid on for all to enjoy, free of charge.

Past events have included - Cocktail Evening, Bingo, Race Nights, Black Tie Dinner, Murder Mystery, Live Music, Disco, 6 Nations Rugby, Euro's, Eurovision, and the list goes on ... Events are often varied to accommodate as many people as possible and we are always open to members' thoughts and suggestions.
